




When I first arrived at Roger Bacon nine years ago, I remember asking our friars for a marketing phrase we could use to sum up what being Franciscan meant. I never received a cute or succinct phrase that adequately defined "Franciscan." I frequently heard words such as "humble, "disciplined" or "simple" to describe our friars. While each description is correct, individually they fail to capture the essence of the Franciscan way. After being a part of Roger Bacon for almost a decade, I believe the Franciscan charism can be summed up in a simple phase: everyone has value. St. Francis saw value in all of God's creation, be it nature, animals or other people – even the most outcast of society, the lepers. It is this foundational belief that underscores our actions at Roger Bacon. The "caring and challenging environment" our mission statement calls us to establish is based on the fundamental belief that everyone has value. This belief, embraced by our faculty, staff and students, is the primary reason that Roger Bacon has a waiting list and has become the Catholic coed school of choice in Cincinnati. It does not matter where you live, the size of your house, your last name, the car you drive or the clothes you wear – everyone has value. Most importantly, that value is recognized and fostered by our entire school community.

As I write this, our campus is closed and we are in the middle of online instruction brought on by the pandemic. It has been a challenging time for everyone – teachers, students and parents. Yet, I am extremely proud of how everyone has rallied together to make the best out of a very difficult situation. In

times like these, we fall back on our Franciscan values of compassion, discipline, gratitude, acceptance and joy to carry us through. We continue to provide the best quality education possible, regardless the trying circumstances, in a Franciscan atmosphere where everyone is valued. *It is who we are and what we do.*

NATIONAL MEDAL AWARDS

The Alliance for Young Artists & Writers presented *Anna Merz* and *Noor Essakalli* with the NATIONAL MEDAL AWARDS. Anna Merz won a gold medal for her work "Vacant" (pictured right) and Noor Essakalli a silver medal for "Synchronized" (pictured below right). More than 110,000 students submitted nearly 320,000 works of art to the 2020 Scholastic Awards. Only 3,000 works received a National Medal, which places our student(s) within the top 1% of all submissions! Their name(s) will also be listed in the Yearbook 2020, a companion publication to The Best Teen Art and The Best Teen Writing anthologies which feature a selection of work by National Medalists. Gold medal recipient's work will be on display in New York for the National Ceremony held in June.

The Roger Bacon Drama Guild presented THE DIARY OF ANNE FRANK in November of 2019 to three sellout audiences. 




