

A friend caught me by surprise recently when he said, "This must be such a gratifying time to be a teacher." We have settled into something that does feel familiar, but I will be honest that "gratifying" is not usually the first word that comes to mind when I think about what teaching looks like now. This year has been an adventure; students and teachers have had to be flexible and patient with frustrations that feel like they get in the way of the "real work" of education. However, working through challenges, troubleshooting tech problems, and, most importantly, facing this together presents rich opportunities for students to get ready to enter a changing world.

What you'll find inside the classrooms at Roger Bacon are students and teachers doing many of the same activities in new ways. You might see one or two students plugged into iPads to link the remote students with the physical classroom or the entire class "Zooming" with a teacher who is at home. In the socially distant classroom,

you might see students in Zoom breakout rooms analyzing short stories and solving math problems. Their group work may be conducted in a Google slide deck or collaborative whiteboard instead of clustered around a poster board. Though this may look different on the surface, students are still preparing for the science fair and the ACT. They are applying what they learn about Constitutional Amendments and Catholic Social Teachings to current events. They are submitting artwork to the Scholastic competition and applications to college. They are showing us that we can rethink how we communicate and learn. This is, indeed, the "real work" of education.

All this adapting can be exhausting and frustrating, but the fact that it allows us to keep our school open and keep students in-person is gratifying. I am looking forward to the day when we do not have to speak through masks and when students can push their desks together to work. However, if I spend my days wanting to get through this time we find ourselves in until we can "just get back to normal," I would be missing a tremendous opportunity to be grateful for the gift of this time, the blessing of walking this journey (or riding this roller coaster) with our students. I hope that we have been able to preserve a sense of routine and stability.

Recently, my students discussed "I've Been to the Mountaintop," the last speech Martin Luther King Jr. delivered. King says that if God offered him the opportunity to live in any time throughout history, he would choose the present time. He acknowledges, "Now, that's a strange statement to make because the world is all messed

up. The nation is sick, trouble is in the land, confusion all around. That's a strange statement. But I know, somehow, that only when it is dark enough can you see the stars." Though the speech was delivered over 50 years ago, his words struck a chord with me. To be sure, our entire country is dealing with fear and anxiety and uncertainty. It can be all too easy to get stuck thinking the entire year of 2020 was a disaster. This school year has not been ideal. However, our job as educators is not to prepare students for the ideal but for the real. In a world that is often discordant, may they be, as the Prayer of St. Francis says, "instruments

In addition, the students sent CHRIST-MAS CARDS to residents of Maple Knoll Retirement Community, VALENTINES to residents of Valencia Gardens in Loveland and notes of encouragement to the swim team at Bellarmine University (Kentucky) who were finally able to participate in a delayed swim tournament (due to the CoVid Pandemic).





COMMUNITY OUTREACH

As a Franciscan high school, we are called to permeate our society with Gospel values. We are to be instruments of change and heralds of peace in a broken world, reaching out to all people, especially the poor and marginalized, through service, reconciliation, and healing.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH BOARD (COB)

Fifteen students take on the role of COB members each year. They help oversee, facilitate, and encourage service throughout the school community. Programming includes Shantytown, the Freshman Service Retreat, as well as the items listed here

ASSIST-A-FAMILY

Students, faculty, staff, and alumni work together during the holiday season to collect gifts for the materially poor of our city. For four weeks, we collect new clothes, games, toys and money to donate to local social service agencies who serve families in depressed areas of our city.

BACON BUDDIES

The Bacon Buddies program gives RB students the opportunity to be mentors to the students at St. Francis Seraph School. Monthly meetings are scheduled in which students from both schools engage in conversation, focus on a character value, and enjoy a fun activity.

MARCH FOR LIFE

All students are invited to participate in the March for Life in Washington, DC. Praying, marching, and touring DC are all a part of the three day trip.

URBAN PLUNGE WITH ST. VINCENT DE PAUL

In partnership with the Ozanam Center for Service Learning, RB students can experience service learning, rooted in faith, regarding poverty and justice issues with the hope of growing the student's commitment to service and community engagement.

MISSION TRIP TO JAMAICA

In partnership with Fr. Jim Bok at Mary Gate of Heaven Parish in Negril, Jamaica. Mission work includes house rehab, tutoring, and serving at the soup kitchen. In addition to volunteering, students have the opportunity to enjoy the tastes and sites that Jamaica has to offer.

MONTHLY SERVICE OPPORTUNITIES

In addition to the opportunities listed above, all students are welcome to join us in our support of St. Francis Seraph Soup Kitchen as well as St. Paul's Archbishop Leibold Home.

SERVICE HOURS

Education is more than just abour learning facts and developing skills. In living out the Roger Bacon's motto, "In Holiness and Learning," we strive to teach students about living holy lives and serving God by serving others in need. It is something that must be put into action.






Agnes Moorehead, Judy Garland,



This award has vited on by the OPSWA (Ohio Prep Sportswifers Affociation and has been awarded annually since 1987 to the best high school feetball player in the State of Ohio. Corey is the 34th player, and only the third player in the Chrismon area, to receive this honor.

Corey rushed for 1,866 yards and 35 touchdowns this season, leading our Spartans to a regional championship and birth in the state final four. He also had 3 receptions for 71 yards and a touchdown, and returned 6 kickoffs for 196 yards and a touchdown. He accomplished all of this despite not playing more than 10 quarters due to Roger Bacon having large leads after halftime. Corey scored one touchdown for every 4.9 rushes.

"Roger Bacon is my family. I knew that it would mean a lot more for me to stay here and win with my family. I knew in my heart that if we just kept pushing on, we would eventually turn things around and change the culture." The decision paid off. Over the last two seasons, RB won 20 games, which are the most in a two-year period in the program's history. It is also the first time we've had back-to-back 10-win season.

Earlier this week, Corey was named to the Division V All-State First Team for the second year in a row, as well as the Division V Offensive Player of the Year. He was also named the District Player-of-the-Year and Miami Valley Conference Player-of-the-Year for the second year in a row. If there was a "Quadruple Crown" of high school football – Corey achieved that this year.

Tim Stried from OHSAA and local media joined the RB administration and the 2020 Regional Champion football team to present the award to Corey at ceremony held at school. Corey has demolished the Roger Bacon record book with careers stats that may never be rivaled, as well as making his mark on the state of Ohio record books. With the Mr. Football award added to his accolades, he will now officially be remembered as one of the greatest student-athletes in Ohio football history.

"Corey Kiner is a once in a lifetime type of student athlete. Not only is he a record-setting running back on the field, he is one of the most humble, hardworking and generous players off the field" said Coach Mike Blaut '88. Corey said "I had the best four years ever. I made life-long friends, learned life lessons and had the most fun while doing it. Thank you!"

We feel terrible for the inductees and their families and friends but with the conditions and Covid restrictions, we felt it was in the best interest of Roger Bacon and the Women's Hall of Fame Ceremony to cancel. Like the Stag, it is not just a Hall of Fame ceremony; it is an event, a reunion, and a celebration of Roger Bacon history and we feel the inductees deserve to be recognized in person" says RB Athletic Director, Steve Rossi.



On October 7, 2020,

Adam Trigg-Holdman shot a season-best 76 and ADVANCED TO STATE on a one-hole, sudden-death PLAYOFF. Adam's teammates wore special t-shirts to support Adams' trip to state –

"In Trigg We Trust." "Adam finished tied for 20th in the state (out of 72), and also shot the 13th best score (163) of any golfer in the State Championship in October. I was most proud of Adam after he had a tough first 9 holes and instead of quitting, he put up his best 9 of the tournament on the back 9. Adam had every opportunity to shut it down but he grinded out his best golf of the weekend. It was a true Spartan performance, and I am proud to be his coach" said Nick Rosenfeldt (Varsity Golf Coach).





The Spartans state tournament run came to an end in the Division V state semifinals with a 22-19 loss to Ironton at Bowles Field in London, OH.

But it was a season for the history books as Figer Byton went 10-1, won the Miami Valley Conference outright and became the first team in program history to win a regional championship and advance to the state Final Four.

Our Spartans faced a 13-0 deficit with 10 minutes left in the first half but then put their foot on the gas and dialed in and scored two TDs within 57 seconds in the second quarter to tie the game up at 13-13. The first TD was a 20 yard pass from *Logan Huber* '22 to *Ryan Hallau* '21. That TD pass was set up by a forced fumble & recovery by *Kyle Guyer* '22.

Three plays later, the Spartans forced another fumble and *Evan Webb* '21 recovered at the RB 31 yard line. The Spartans then pulled out some trickery as *Danny Hudepohl* '21 got the ball in the backfield on a reverse and threw 31 yard TD pass to *Jake Tschida* '22 to tie the game up heading into halftime.

During Ironton's first possession of the second half, Evan Webb came up big once again forcing and recovering a fumble to give the Spartans momentum. RB then marched down the field on a 12-play 85 yard TD drive led by *Corey Kiner* '21 who had 7 carries for 59 yards and a TD on the drive. The TD run by Kiner was setup by a huge first down pickup by *Jah'mal Hutsell* '22. This gave RB their first lead of the game at 19-13

RB led heading into the final quarter but Ironton bounced back and retook the lead after a TD and a safety. The Spartan defense locked in with 5 minutes left and forced a punt with 4:59 left in the game to give the offense one more shot. A couple of huge plays occurred on the last drive including a one handed catch by Hallau on a 3rd & 14 to give the Spartans life. Unfortunately, the Spartans could not capitalize after that and their historic season came to an end.

This class of 2021 seniors helped lead RB to a 20-3 record over the last two seasons which includes a 13-0 record at home. Their two playoff losses combined by a total of 4 points.

In 1954, JERRY MURRAY '57 received a phone call from the Cincinnati Reds. They asked him if he would like to be their bat boy. Originally, he thought it would be for the Reds, but someone

else had already taken the job—Bernie Stowe (the future and legendary clubhouse manager for the Reds). Jerry would be the visiting team bat boy. His job would be to run errands, clean spikes,

hang up jock straps and, of course, be the bat boy for all Reds' opponents. He would be paid \$5/day and a typical

working day would be from 9 am-midnight!

Jerry was actually a very good baseball player in his own right from Northside (St. Boniface Parish). He made the Roger Bacon varsity baseball squad as a sophomore for Coach Bacevich's team. As a junior, he not only made the varsity team but was in the starting line up until the Reds called again to rehire him. (At that point, Coach Bacevich was not very happy and uttered to Jerry that he was a "gutless wonder! It was coach's fiery persona that Jerry respected immensely.)

Jerry's other role model at Roger Bacon was Fr. Andrew Fox, OFM. Fr. Andrew allowed him to keep the job with the Reds even though Jerry took many days off from school and sometimes needed an early dismissal to catch the bus to Crosley Field.

He has many stories to share from some of the most famous baseball players who played professional baseball: Willie Mays, Ernie Banks, Roberto Clemente, Duke Snider, Eddie Mathews, Hank Aaron, Warren Spahn, Roy Campanella and his favorite player, Stan Musial. He has written many different stories of these men and hopes to have his short stories ("Dugout Diaries") published soon. Jerry's top story involved the Pittsburgh Pirates manager Danny Murtaugh. During a game Murtaugh was so aggravated with one of the Reds pitchers throwing "spit balls" that he started to carry a bucket of water to the pitching mound for the pitcher

to wet his fingers.
The umpire threw
Murtaugh out
mid-trip. Murtaugh
begged and tried to
bribe Jerry to finish
the trip. At that
point the umpire
told Jerry that if he
completed the trip,
he would be the first
bat boy in history
to be thrown out
of a major league
baseball game!

After graduation from Roger Bacon and the Reds job, he played "Muni-Ball" (semi-professional baseball) in Cincinnati, with fellow 1957 graduate WALT ROECKERS. Jerry even received

a tryout with the Cincinnati Reds. He played many years of softball later and even subbed for the *Cincinnati Suds* one weekend. Jerry now lives on the west side of Cincinnati and is married with two sons, Mike and Jeff. He is retired and enjoys telling his amazing stories of his years with the Cincinnati Reds!

the years flew by

JOE STAVALE '88 writes:

I think my RB class of 1988 produced several stellar fresh recruits and officer candidates for our country's military



services. I hope I deserve to be referenced among them. Deciding to join the military was one of the best decisions of my life. Seeing and hearing the various military representatives who came

to RB during inspired me to serve for four years with plans to return home with college money to pursue an engineering degree at UC. Little did I know how much I would enjoy serving and how 30+ years flew by.

I was far from being a great student and getting into college wasn't going to be easy, all I wanted to do upon graduating from RB was to see the world and be a part of something big. The military was a good fit for me, and I inquired about joining the Air Force with aspirations of a future in aviation. yearbook as "tall, and sleepy, with a poetical look." His wife Helen was also a product of a Catholic education attending St. Boniface Elementary School and Our Lady of Mercy High School. Together they had five sons (Mike, Mark, Daniel, Timothy and Joe).

Early in 2020 we met with some of the brothers about their desire to establish an endowed scholarship at Roger Bacon in their parents' name honoring their faith and devotion to the value of a Catholic education. Three of the siblings were graduates of St. Xavier High School and two attended Roger Bacon High School. The brothers felt very strongly that the Catholic education they received had a significant influence on their own lives and faith. After their mother passed away at the age of 96 in July, we talked again and all of the brothers committed to establishing the Paul L. and Helen L. Temming scholarship at Roger Bacon to assist young people who otherwise would not be able to afford a Catholic education. In addition to making a significant difference in the lives of young people for years to come, they wanted to share their story to hopefully inspire others to consider a similar investment in the students of Roger Bacon.
