Built on the Shou

On July 5, 1926, Archbishop John T. McNicholas extended a formal invitation to the Very Reverend Edmund Klein, OFM, Provincial Minister of the Cincinnati Province of Franciscans to "prepare for and to open as soon as possible a Boys' High School." On July 8, 1926, the Franciscan Minister Provincial "decided to comply with the wishes of Your Grace to conduct a high school for boys in Cincinnati for the Franciscan parishes and those neighboring parishes that wish to join in with us." Archbishop McNicholas formally announced a new program amounting to the establishment of a centralized archdiocesan high school system on July 11, 1927. The program made parishes in Cincinnati "tributary" to one of the boys and to one of the girls' central high schools.

ORIGINAL BOYS' CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOLS:

- St. Xavier Classical High School. Founded in 1831; run by the Jesuit Fathers as a private high school.
- Elder High School. Opened in 1922 as a coed school staffed by diocesan priests; became boys-only in 1927 when girls were transferred to Seton High School.
- **Purcell High School.** Opened in 1928; run by the Brothers of Mary; boys transferred from St. Mary High School.
- Roger Bacon High School. Opened in 1928; sponsored by Franciscan Fathers of the Cincinnati Province.

ORIGINAL GIRLS' CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOLS:

- St. Mary High School. Opened in 1908 staffed by diocesan priests; became girls only in 1927 when boys were transferred to Purcell High School; renamed Marian High School in 1963 and run by the Sisters of Charity; merged with Purcell High School in 1981.
- Seton High School. Founded as Mount St. Vincent Academy in 1854 run by the Sisters of Charity; renamed Elizabeth Ann Seton High School in 1927 with the arrival of girls from Elder High School.
- Regina High School. Founded in 1928 by Sisters of the Precious Blood; closed in 1977 and students went to Marian High School, Mount Notre Dame or OLA.
- Our Lady of Angels High School. Founded in 1928 and run by the Oldenburg Sisters of St. Francis; closed in 1984 when Roger Bacon became coed.

305 STUDENTS REGISTERED FOR CLASS ON MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 17, 1928. THE ENROLLMENT WAS AS FOLLOWS:

When Roger Bacon started in September 1928, the seniors, juniors, and sophomores came from St. George High School. The freshmen came from the following *twenty-eight parishes* which were assigned to Roger Bacon High School:

FOOTBALL. Roger Bacon finished the first season 1-4-1. The first football game was played against Hamilton Catholic on Friday, September 28, 1928. Roger Bacon fell 31-0. The first victory was the following week, Friday, October 5, 1928, when Roger Bacon defeated the cadets from Ohio Military Institute 12-6. Robert Ruberg '31 scored the first Spartan touchdown. Sixteen members of the team, headed by Captain Emil "Skeets" Calme, '29 were awarded varsity letters at the football banquet.



BASKETBALL. Roger Bacon's first game was a home game on Friday, December 13, 1928. Played at St. Clement's Auditorium, the Spartans defeated Western Hills 20-18. Alphonse Humbert '30 scored the first points for Roger Bacon and was the leading Spartan scorer with 10. The team finished the first year with a record of 8-11. At the annual basketball banquet, nine players were awarded varsity letters.



BASEBALL. The first game played was a 10-3 defeat at the hands of the Woodward Bulldogs. Freshman Matthew "Matza" Thernes '32 picked up the first win in Roger Bacon history with a complete game, 9-strikeout 6-0 victory over Western Hills. Thernes followed up this effort with a complete game 3-2 victory over Purcell, the first league win for Roger Bacon.

Iders of Giants

SEPTEMBER 16, 1929. Roger Bacon began its second scholastic year with an enrollment of 461 students. The second year saw upperclassmen (sophomores through seniors) start the year in the new high school. Freshmen started classes at St. Clement School.

OCTOBER 21, 1929. Freshmen moved into the new high school, occupying the 3rd floor.

OCTOBER 26, 1929. Roger Bacon High School was formally dedicated. Most Reverend Archbishop John T. McNicholas, O.P., D.D., officiated at the dedication ceremony.

Sacrifice. Love. Provide.

Built on the shoulders of giants. As we approach our 100th anniversary and plan for our future, it is a phrase that holds significant meaning. It is a testament to those that came before us and the profound influences that made us who we are today: the iconic teacher that devoted his or her life to inspire students; the legendary coach that built a powerhouse program; the friar or sister that provided spiritual guidance (or for some, discipline). It is also the over 24,000 alumni who walked these hallowed halls creating a tradition that is carried on today.

We were approached a few months ago by two families, unrelated, wanting to honor the biggest, most profound influences in their lives – their parents. Their stories fit perfectly with this theme. Parents truly are those everyday heroes who sacrifice, love, and provide the foundation for the rest of our lives.

THE WILLARD "RED" AND MARY STOLL FAMILY ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIP

Willard "Red" and Mary Stoll's life was their family. The parents of ten children (including five sons who attended Roger Bacon; Ken, Mike, Chris, Jim, and Steve,



along with son-in-law Mike Kelsey, whom Red and Mary loved like their own), they lived in a 1000 square foot house in South Fairmont where everyone was always welcome. It was THE place to be. That cramped but lively home, filled with laughter, love, parental wisdom, and the presence of the Lord made that little house feel like a mansion. It was the center of the Stoll Family universe.

Their faith and Catholic education were extremely important to them. Through sacrifice and hard work, Red and Mary sent each of their children, from kindergarten through high school, to a Catholic school. Red was a milkman for over 45 years. Mary was a stay-at-home mom until the youngest child was in his teens, then became a school cafeteria employee in the Cincinnati School District. Their strong work ethic and commitment to give back to the community was instilled in their children.

After the passing of Red and Mary's son in-law, Ed Doyle, Dennis and Lois Doyle contacted the Stoll Family. Ed, Dennis' brother had so much love and respect for Red, Mary, and the Stoll Family that Dennis and Lois wanted to honor them by creating a scholarship in their name. Dennis and Lois, like the Stolls, are incredible advocates and supporters of Catholic education. They established the Dennis and Lois Doyle Foundation Seedling Program. The foundation "plants seeds" in the name of other families as a vehicle to which they can contribute to, build, and grow an endowment. "For those of us who are able, we need to pay it forward...we stood on the shoulders of others, if others stand on our shoulders, they will in turn pay it forward and future generations will benefit" says Dennis.

THE DONALD A. MILLER ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIP

Donald Miller graduated from Roger Bacon in 1946. He married his wife, Shirley '48 OLA in 1950 and had eight children, including three sons who attended Roger Bacon



(Dave '71, Richard '80 and Dan '84). Their devoted son-in-law, Joe Sanders '77, also attended RB.

Donald Miller died in 2019 following almost 70 years of marriage to Shirley. According to his son, Rick, Don was an extraordinarily kind and compassionate man and would direct that kindness to everyone, without exception. Compassion. It is a value that we cherish at Roger Bacon. It is one of the sixteen Franciscan values that we emphasize to our students. It is integral to our mission statement, "Rooted in the Franciscan values of holiness and learning, self-discipline and compassion, Roger Bacon is a Catholic high school which develops the hearts, minds and bodies of its young men and women in a caring and challenging environment." And, it is a characteristic that the world most definitely needs more of, now more than ever.

The Stoll and Miller names and their legacies of hard work, devotion to family, and kindness will live on forever at Roger Bacon.

A VFRY ACTIVE PROGRAM

Fifteen students take on the leadership role of COMMUNITY OUTREACH BOARD members each year. They oversee, facilitate, and encourage service throughout our school community. Programming includes Shantytown, the Freshman Service Retreat, and much more.

TRASH OTR is a monthly project on a Sunday during the school year that aims in beautifying Over The Rhine, ending with lunch at Findlay Market.

SOW LOVE is a monthly project during the academic school year. Students take the time to decorate posters with art, quotes and words of encouragement. These posters are hung on the walls of school, in hopes to offer love and a sense of community and comfort to students who walk the halls of RB.

WRITING HOPE is a project held once a month during the school year. Spartans write letters to our friends at the Archbishop Leibold Home in a pen pal system. This project gives the opportunity for students to write to the elderly about their Roger Bacon life. The men and women at Archbishop Leibold Home have the opportunity to write back to our students, talking about their life and favorite memories as a high school student.

ST. ANTHONY KITCHEN is a monthly project where students volunteer at St. Anthony Kitchen to assist in serving meals and cleaning up.

ASSIST-A-FAMILY is an annual service project that the whole school takes part in during the holidays. Each flex room creates a giving tree that has ornaments with names of our brothers and sisters in the community and what they need, such as shampoo or toothbrushes. Money donated goes toward purchasing \$10 Kroger gift cards.

ST. CLEMENT FOOD PANTRY is a monthly service project offered to students of RB. Spartans come together to load boxes with food and essential items to give to members of the community around them.

CHEMOPAX is a project designed for students to decorate white paper bags with drawings and inspirational quotes or phrases for patients undergoing Chemotherapy, aiming to bring light and joy. The bags are donated to Christ Hospital where they are filled with snacks and given to cancer patients.

RB FARM FRENZY takes place on two scheduled dates during the school year on a Saturday. This project aims to emphasize caring for creation through hands on work.

200 YEARS OF FAITH

In order to CELEBRATE 200 YEARS OF FAITH IN THE ARCHDIOCESE OF CINCINNATI, religious communities, along with their friends, supporters and partners in ministry, and area schools and parishes, all came together for service to others. The official archdiocesan day of service was Oct. 9, but outreach efforts are also encouraged before and after that date.

Because the day of service coincided with Death Penalty Abolition Week for Ohio faith communities, Oct. 8-17, the SJB friars asked others to join them in a letter writing campaign to Ohio legislators, encouraging them to support HB 183 and SB 103 to abolish the death penalty. Hand written letters were sent because they are more likely to be reviewed by elected officials.

Students and staff dedicated the whole week to service, according to *Fr. Roger Lopez.* "This helped us reflect on our presence in southern Ohio, especially as Franciscans. Like St. Francis, who reached out to those forgotten and overlooked, Roger Bacon students reached out to place our Christian faith in action."

The schedule included:

MONDAY, OCT. 4: Solemnity of St. Francis with the whole day celebrating Franciscan life.

TUESDAY, OCT. 5: Bingo with the residents at St. Paul/Archbishop Leibold Home for the Aged and Infirmed.

WEDNESDAY, OCT. 6: "Sow Love" - Students created cards of gratitude and encouragement for the archdiocese sponsored ministries of St. Rita School for the Deaf and Catholic Charities of Southwest Ohio.

THURSDAY, OCT. 7: "Coffee with Christ" - Before school started, students gathered to reflect on the importance of faith and service.

FRIDAY, OCT. 8: "Freshmen Service Day" - Ninth grade students traveled to Over-the-Rhine to work with non-profit organizations and discover the importance of reflecting on service.

SUNDAY, OCT. 10: "Trash OTR" - Students gathered for Eucharist at St. Francis Seraph Church, followed by beautifying the neighborhood. Afterwards, all who were involved enjoyed lunch at Findlay Market.

Roger Bacon is the only Franciscan high school in Cincinnati, and prides itself on a small, diverse, co-educational, family-like environment. Utilizing St. Francis of Assisi's emphasis on love, compassion and inclusion, Roger Bacon has embraced its rich Franciscan tradition since 1928 to not only prepare students with exceptional academics, but also to develop their hearts, bodies, and souls. Mr. Schad wanted an honors program truly unique to Roger Bacon - one that would not only speak to the heart of its Franciscan values, but also to the heart of the students. With this, the ASSISI SCHOLARS PROGRAM was born.

The Assisi Scholars Program at Roger Bacon is designed for sophomore to senior honors-level students, offering the rigorous academic development that one expects from an honors program, preparing students committed to academic success with a diverse and challenging curriculum. This includes the unique AP Capstone™ Diploma Program, allowing students to set themselves apart in the college application process and to develop key academic skills they

will use in college and beyond. There is also a focus on developing strong leadership and spiritual growth, as students are immersed in the values of St. Francis, St. Clare, and Friar Roger Bacon – the 13th century Franciscan scientist for which the school is named.

The reward for students who commit to this program is life-changing – an all-expense paid pilgrimage to Assisi and Rome, Italy. This is a true pilgrimage where students walk in the footsteps of St. Francis and St. Clare with their classmates, while visiting historical sites such as the tomb of St. Francis and the Sanctuary at La Verna, and celebrating Mass together at the Basilica of St. Francis.

While the students in this program achieve all of the expected academic accolades – high AP test scores, college course credits, exceptional ACT/SAT scores and tens of millions in college scholarship dollars - it is the pilgrimage that often becomes the most impactful experience.

"There were certainly benefits academically, such as the ACT prep, which helped me get even greater financial awards for college," says *Charles Strunc*, a John Paul II Elementary School alumnus and 2021 graduate of Roger Bacon. "However, the experiences I had in Assisi, with some of the best people I have ever met and had the honor of spending that week with are what made this program and trip so meaningful. I had encounters that breathed new life into my spirituality, taking my faith in God from 'no way' to a 'what if.' This significance cannot be overstated. I had conversations that snowballed into revelations and observations about myself and the world and people around me. It lit a fire within me to be the best person that I can be, and I have been striving for that at (college) every day. I truly believe these changes that I have made in my life since August never would have happened without the trip, and I am forever grateful for it."

Grace Hogshead, a St. Ignatius Elementary School alumnus and Roger Bacon's 2021 salutatorian shares, "The program prepared me to succeed academically in the college arena. I took a variety of advanced-level courses that prepared me for the rigor of college, and allowed me to meet a vast majority of general education requirements before stepping foot on campus. The pilgrimage was a chance for students to fully immerse themselves in Franciscan culture in one of the most beautiful places in the world. Learning about our Franciscan culture and growing in my own faith in a place of so much religious significance is an indescribable experience."

It is this long-view perspective of what an honors program should be that *Mr. Schad* is most proud of. "Roger Bacon is a small school, and your child is not just a number," Mr. Schad emphasizes. "We get to know them personally. The Assisi program is also about more than numbers. What seeds can we plant in the hearts of these students that will take root long after the AP exams and ACT scores have faded? That is what this program is all about, as we send these students, in the words of Roger Bacon, 'Forward to greater things.'"

Basketball's "Scintillating Spartans"-GCL and City Title Champs-Won 23, Lost 1 (from the 1951 Troubadour) Many of the city's coaches and observers expressed the opinion that the 1950-51 Bacon basketball team was perhaps the finest team the city (Cincinnati) had ever had. The Spartans were ear-marked as State Champs (but that honor was not to be realized. Their speed, their lightning-like passing attack and their deadly accuracy from the floor is proved by the fact they they averaged 61 points per game for the season, while defensively holding the opposition to 39 points per game. Bacon rooters will always look back to the '51 team as the CHAMPS.



From the 1951 Troubadour yearbook:

Perhaps the best all-around guard Bacon ever had is **Lou Vonderbrink**.

The genius of Bacon's team and one of the most natural forwards this city has ever seen is Captain **Bill Lammert**.

The big center, **Charlie Hoffman**, was great in rebounding and more spectacular in his pot shots.

Bacon's "Sixth Man," was Jim Sicking—Great things are expected of him before he graduates.

Bacon's set-shot artist was

Mort Cowgell. Mort had a knack
for dropping them in without
touching the rim.

The speedster and ball-snatcher was **Don Paul**, who was terrific on his floor work.



Coach Brian Neal '90 stepped down after this 2021-22 season as boys' head basketball coach. He had a 236-161 career record at RB entering his 17th season as head coach and has the most coaching wins in program history. He served as an assistant coach under the late Bill Brewer for the 2002 state title team. This season will also mark the 20th anniversary of the 2002 state championship victory over LeBron James and Akron St. Vincent-St. Mary high school 71-63 (Division II state final at Value City Arena in Columbus, OH).

"I have been a part of the Roger Bacon High School basketball program every day since I was 14 years old" said Brian. "I am now almost 50; in that time I have grown from being a student, to an alum, to a coach and a teacher." In that time he has been able to watch hundreds of young student-athletes mature into leaders, forge friendship bonds that last a lifetime and learn the sacrifices it takes to fulfill their potential. "I have been incredibly blessed to be the head coach of a successful program; any success attached to my name is only



possible because of the dedication of the players and coaches I have been blessed to work with" said Brian.

He is the son of RB's iconic marching band and music director *Wes Neal*. Brian grew in the hallways of RB and met his wife, *Dr. Amy Neal* '93. He was also a basketball player and after graduation he was hired to work with the RB girls' program under head coach Tom Singleton while also teaching Math. During the 1994 season that team finished as the D-II state runner-up, and in 1995 earned a 28-0 claiming the D-II state championship. Brian then moved back over to

record, claiming the D-II state championship. Brian then moved back over to the boys' side with Coach Bill Brewer as an assistant coach.

Brian plans to continue his roles as Chair of the Math Department and teacher at RB. He has a son (Andrew) who was a senior guard for the Spartans this year and a daughter Libby, who is a freshman at RB. On Saturday, February 12 the home game against McNicholas was renamed "Coach Neal Night" to celebrate and honor the historic career Brian leaves behind.

Tony has donated countless hours in public service to the City of Reading


over the years, having served as Mayor for 12 years, and in the positions of Council-at-Large, City Treasurer, City Service Director, and Councilman for Ward Two.


ZACHARY GREEN '91

As a young married man, his faith was put to the test when his wife, Jane, was diagnosed with Hodgkins disease while she was eight months pregnant. She died when their son, Alex, was 16 months old. Tim raised his son as a single parent

with the help of a loving and supportive family.


He remained involved in the church and balanced the demands of his job as a postal inspector in Washington, DC, along with his parental duties. His son Alex, now 27, returned from Iraq in April (2021) after serving a year with the U.S. Army Reserves as a psychological analyst. "Life experience is not necessarily the only gifts I bring" said Tim. "I can identify with a number of things in the world, like the frenetic pace, because I lived through that reality. But it is from the Holy Spirit that I will also be able to serve. I love the Greensburg

Tim's mother, Janet Kruthaupt, 86, said she was "thrilled to death" that her son was a priest. "He once served as an altar boy, but now I have to remember to call him Fr. Tim!"

KAELYNN SPEED '19 was recently featured in a news story by Cincinnati WKRC. In 2019 she donated her stem cells after matching with a 5-month-old baby boy. Typically, there is a slim chance of becoming anyone's match. However, Kaelynn received a call in a matter of weeks after her cheek swab. It was something she was not expecting: a call to save the life of a baby who was just diagnosed with leukemia. Mads (the baby) was diagnosed with Acute Myeloid Leukemia and needed a bone marrow or stem cell transplant to survive.

Kaelynn had just started nursing school at Wright State University (in 2019) where a bone marrow "drive" was taking place. "I stopped by the nursing school for a10-minute break one day and the "swab" took place." In a matter of weeks Kaelynn found out that she was a 10/10 perfect match for Mads. She was determined to go through the process to help baby Mads. The process is called Peripheral Stem Cell Donation, which is similar to a blood transfusion.

Finally, in 2020 the stem cell donor center (DKMS) set up a video call so Kaelynn could meet Mads and his parents for the first time. "For me, this was a simple act of kindness. I had what I could give and was ready to give it. I think the world needs to be more like that" said Kaelynn.

Mads is now almost three years old. He is in remission and doing well. Katelynn has developed a special bond with Mad's family and they are hoping to meet in person one day.


We are excited to announce that Roger Bacon High School was

Over the past weekend our drama guild accepted the challenge to perform the technically challenging Broadway musical, Newsies. The three evening performances on Thursday, Friday, Saturday and the matinee performance on Sunday afternoon were going to be the culmination of over three months of preparation by over 60 diverse students in the cast and crew.

Saturday evening, a few hours before the scheduled performance, approximately 15 members of the cast and crew became sick, and others were getting sick as we discussed exactly how to handle the situation. The Saturday

performance was being reviewed that evening by the Cappie program, drama students from other schools who review the performance and nominate individuals and elements of the production for a Cappie (equivalent to the Oscars for high school drama programs). After discussing our options, reluctantly the decision was to cancel the Saturday evening performance and reschedule with two performances on Sunday. Overnight several students ended up in Emergency Rooms getting IV's for dehydration.

What happened on Sunday was remarkable. Most of the victims of the illness were back, but it was obvious they were not at 100%. I observed both performances from backstage and watched some of the most impressive teamwork I have


